ALTERNATIVE ADMISSIONS TRACK

Future Generations University offers an Alternative Admissions Track, a path to qualify for the master's program without a bachelor's if you demonstrate that you can perform at a graduate level. Enroll and receive a B or better in four courses, after which you will qualified for admission to the MA program based on your proven performance.

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FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

FUTURE GENERATIONS UNIVERSITY DEGREE: HOW DOES IT WORK?

The University offers one degree: a Master of Arts in Applied Community Development. The degree is 32 credits. Full-time students take nine credits (three classes) per semester.

Four core courses are required for graduation. All other credits can be earned through a combination of elective courses, personalized learning courses, and residential courses.

CAN I ATTEND PART TIME?

Yes! You can take one or two classes, as your schedule permits. Our students have full lives outside of school and a full-time academic schedule isn't feasible for everyone. In addition, you can start classes either in the fall semester or the spring semester. The curriculum is designed with a slight advantage to starting in the fall, but especially for those attending part-time, that advantage is minimal.

HOW DO CLASSES WORK?

The University uses a blended learning model. Classes meet live, online, for one hour each week. All coursework, which includes readings, videos, PowerPoint presentations, are completed and graded online. Every class includes a community lab. All lab work is done within your community, so what you learn in class is applied directly to your community.

DO ALL CLASSES MEET VIRTUALLY?

You can earn your master's degree without having to leave home, as described above. There is no travel requirement. However, optional **Residential Courses** are offered at least twice a year for 2-3 credits. These are similar to short-term study abroad programs. They last 10-14 days and examine aspects of community development around the world.

Recent and upcoming residentials include: Appalachia; India; Nepal; Vietnam; India. Thanks to a generous gift, the cost of attending these residentials is heavily subsidized for students – you pay only regular tuition (\$800 per credit, less University scholarship you may have) plus the cost of travel to/from the Residential. Meals, accommodation, travel during the residential are all covered in the cost of tuition.

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER I APPLY?

Applicants can expect to hear back about their acceptance within five weeks of their completed application. Applications received after the admission deadline will be reviewed as time allows, but may need to defer their start date to the following semester. Upon acceptance, applicants are encouraged to fill out a financial aid application right away. The financial aid process, from application to award, take approximately two weeks.

Once the financial aid process is complete, students receive a future.edu email address and login details to an online onboarding course that familiarizes them Moodle, the University's learning platform, and other digital course tools.
